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Reflections on the Life of My Dad by Sister Carol Jean Kuntz



For the first time in my life, I'll celebrated Father's Day this year without my dad. My dad died a few weeks ago, at the age of 93 (or as he told his nurse, "93 and a quarter") and he was still very much in love with life! He was eager to complete some work in the basement of their house and was at the lumberyard, buying lumber, when he tripped and fell and broke several bones. These injuries led to complications which caused his death.

It is interesting that when one dies, it seems that I no longer remember the negative things but what comes to mind are the things that made the person interesting and unique. It is truly a blessing for me. I was home to visit Mom a few days ago and it struck me that even though Dad's physical presence was no longer there, it seemed that in every room and in conversations, there were memories of him. It seems that:

•the TV should have been on and he would have been watching reruns of Bonanza

or Gunsmoke

- he would be bragging about his "peace garden" and would be taking me out to the backyard to show me the size of his tomato plants.
- he would be ready to play a game of pinochle.
- he would be asking Mom what we where having for lunch and what time it would be served.
- he would be sitting out on the swing in the front lawn watching who went by.
- he would be showing me some pictures or a map.
- he would be driving his little red "Scooter" to make his daily visits to the neighborhood.
- he would have showed me anything "new" since I was last home.
- · he would say, "bring me a big glass of 'W'. "
- he would be tasting the soup and we would be arguing about how many noodles to put in.

One of my final images of dad, as he was lying unconscious on his hospital bed, was my mom, sisters and brothers all around him as we prayed the rosary together. Our tears were flowing freely and we were able to give comfort to one another as we prayed together. Another blessing was the priest who came to give dad the Anointing of the Sick. He encouraged us each to spend a few minutes alone with dad, even if it was just 15 seconds, to say "I love you, I forgive you, and will you forgive me?" We each did this, starting with Mom and then from the oldest to the youngest of my siblings and myself. Those 15+ seconds were profound. Someone made the remark that it looked like we were going to the Scrament of Reconciliation. Really that is what was happening as we asked for forgiveness and received forgiveness.

So Dad, I remember the good things you shared with us and gave to us. You will be missed but I rejoice that you are now with God. May you rest in peace.

We plan on setting a date for a fall gathering and continue to have at least two gatherings a year at our home. Everyone enjoyed and appreciated the day together.

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Open House Held for New MRI Suite and Pharmacy

On Wednesday, March 28, 2012, St. Margaret's Health in Spring Valley, Illinois, held a blessing ceremony and open house for two of their newest departments – the new MRI Suite and the newly renovated Pharmacy area.

The Pletsch MRI Center on the first floor of the hospital, houses a new GE Optima MR450w MRI scanner. This machine provides clear, detailed scans of bones, ligaments, cartilage, blood vessels and organs. The wide-bore opening helps reduce patient anxiety and claustrophobic feelings, making patient comfort top priority. St. Margaret's looks forward to utilizing this technology, permanently onsite, while providing more opportunities for their patients. This new equipment can also perform MRI of the breast, which was not a previously offered service.

An MRI can be an intimidating process for a patient who has never had one before or one who is waiting for a diagnosis and contemplating all of those "what ifs" that float around their head. The St. Margaret's MRI Suite hopes to allay some of those fears and apprehension that a patient may have.

"The beautiful, spiritual décor of the area has helped patients relax before and during their scans," says Karen Gress, VP Ancillary & Support Services. "From the peaceful oil paintings in the waiting area, to the spiritual wall hanging that greets you when you walk through the door, to the back-lit, faux 'sky light' over the machine, all these pieces aim to remind patients to be calm, relaxed, and that this process is not going to hurt them."

Just adjacent to the new MRI area, the Pharmacy department has taken residency, moving from their previous ground floor home. The renovation of this area provides Pharmacy with much needed additional space to improve their workflow and improve efficiency. A pneumatic tube system was installed to provide a better distribution plan for medications.

Terry Arkins, Manager of Pharmacy, stated, "We were certainly in need of more work space and look forward to having a better work flow, especially with the pneumatic tube system. This will allow us to deliver medications directly to patient care areas so that nursing staff do not have to leave their area to pick up medications for their patients."

The new design also provides for improved privacy for employees who are filling, picking up, or asking questions about their prescriptions. There is also a separate area to allow Nursing Supervisors access to fill commonly needed medications when Pharmacy is closed.

The blessing and open house held in March was well attended by physicians, staff, the Administrative Team, and

Within 7 months the children and the womens' guilds of these congregations were ready to give their gifts of money. Sister Suzanne who had been with Sister Anne Germaine in our Region of Cameroon for three months April-May-June, 2011 made the trip to meet the church members of northern North Dakota. Besides worshipping with them in their churches she gave the "sermon" for the services, sharing pictures and stories of the people of Cameroon and their needs. The children and women in turn presented \$2100.00. What a great outpouring of generosity! Sisters Suzanne and Anne Germaine continue to be available for presentations about Cameroon ministries.

Striving For Peace Does Not Mean Allowing Violence to Continue

Father John Dear, Jesuit priest was a keynote speaker at the National Association of Catholic Chaplain's Conference May 18-May 22. Attending was certified chaplain, Sister Suzanne Stahl, SMP as well as about 400 other chaplains. Fr. Dear spoke with passion about Jesus' call to each of us to be peacemakers. Using scripture he pointed out that "just war" is not what the gospel commands us to do but rather to change "spears into plow shares."

Fr. Dear is an author/editor of 25 books, including his autobiography, A Persistent Peace and was nominated for the Nobel Peace Prize by Archbishop Desmond Tutu in 2008. He has been in prison 80 times for peaceful acts of civil disobedience working to end war. He was mentored by Jesuit Father Daniel Berrigan and his brother Philip Berrigan nationally known peace activists. His presentation was moving and Spirit filled urging attendees to stop all violence and to speak up and actively stand for peace personally, nationally and internationally. After this presentation Sister Suzanne said, "I realized that I have been allowing society's rumblings to end terror by using force to influence me. Fr. Dear called me back to my belief in active peacemaking rather than using violence to fight violence."



Maryhill's Open House

wonderful turnout of approximately 200 people came to Maryhill's "first look" open house Tuesday, May 1st to see the new additions. Many positive comments were heard as people toured through the additions: "The new rooms are so big," "the chapel is beautiful," "the therapy room is in such a convenient location." Gladys Dagman Howe was honored at the open house and reminisced about her workdays at Maryhill (then "Hillcrest Manor"). Gladys said, "I received a call at 8:00 in the morning on May 1st 1964 and was asked to start work at 2:00 that day! Our first resident came in that afternoon. She was the only one we had for awhile, so I spent a lot of time washing windows and whatever else was needed." Gladys worked as a nurses' aide for the first two years of her employment at Maryhill and became the administrator in 1966, serving in this role until 1982. In her gracious style, Gladys thanked everyone for being honored in this way, but stated that she never could have done it alone and that she worked with a great group of people. Gladys is now a resident at Maryhill Manor. In response to Gladys' comments, Nancy Farnham, current Administrator, stated, "I hope that people will talk about me some day like they talk about you, Gladys." Nancy also thanked the staff members for all their help with the project, the donors who have generously contributed their support, Maryhill's neighbors for putting up with the trucks

and increased traffic, and, most of all, the Maryhill residents for handling the inconveniences of construction in their home with such good humor and patience. Comments were also made by Sister Carol Jean Kuntz, the Sisters of Mary of Presentation provincial leader and Aaron Alton, SMP Health System President who expressed appreciation to the community for their support and their joy in being able to enhance the services for the area with this project. A beautiful blessing service followed for the new chapel and additions. The service was led by the Reverend Monsignor Joseph Goering, Vicar General from the Fargo Diocesan Office, and assisted by Pastor Terry Monson from the Trinity Lutheran Church in Enderlin. Highlights of the building project include:

- A chapel was added to provide a meaningful place for worship. The altar from Fillmore Lutheran Church graces the chapel. Collin Trangsrud, with assistance from Pastor Frank Dobos and Lila Trangsrud, completed the work on the altar to prepare it for its new home.
- A larger therapy room was added to the front of the building to enhance services and provide easy access for outpatients.
- Five larger double rooms were added with a layout that is designed to give more privacy to each resident.

- The number of private rooms will increase from 10 to 20.
- A sprinkler system was installed throughout the entire building for added safety.
- New windows were installed in the north and south hallways.
- A radiant heat system was installed in the south hallway.
- Two patios were added to the front of the building and a sunroom was added on the east side so all can enjoy the outdoors.
- The building was reshingled.
- New carpeting was installed in the living room, dining room, and central hallway.
- The office area was remodeled to bring more offices together in a convenient location for residents and families and to include a small conference room.

There are finishing touches left to complete the project, including repaving of the front parking lot and signage. The entire project will be completed by the end of June. The capital campaign will also continue until the end of June, with any donations of \$1,000 or more to be commemorated on a display plaque. Maryhill Manor will host an open house in December as part of the CLIO Tour of Homes to give the community an opportunity to see the project again after everything is complete.


